

THE YEAR 2022-2023 was one of **hard work**, in which our team continued to support Lowertown residents and help them fight for their **rights** individually and collectively. The year was characterized by transition, solidification, growth and success.

First, and as always, the Lowertown Community Resource Centre (LCRC) stood up against the inequities affecting the residents and the neighbourhood of Lowertown, whether in terms of issues of racism, housing or access to space and services for young people. We never give up!

Like everyone else, we have also had to continue to **manage the tensions** stemming from the pandemic, and we constantly adapted to the needs of the community. It's easy to forget that we were still in the midst of restrictions and anti-COVID measures at the beginning of April 2022.

Our team and the community had to say "au revoir" to two important members of the LCRC, Nancy Darisse and Alain Lutala, long-time employees who have made career transitions and whom we would like to **thank** for their invaluable contributions over the years. We have also welcomed new members to the team with open arms.

The year 2022-2023 also allowed us to **solidify the internal structure** of the LCRC, among other things by creating and filling the key position of Program Director. It is also important to note that the organization's budget **exceeded \$2M** for the first time in its history, with revenues totalling \$2.1M. We now have a team of over 40 employees, including 17 permanent positions.

We are most pleased to highlight one of our greatest successes for 2022-2023, namely the **expansion of sports and recreational activities** for young people thanks to the Lowertown / Strathcona Rising initiative. Thanks to donations and a grant from the City of Ottawa's Community Safety and Well-Being Fund, there are now several time slots for **basketball**, indoor and outdoor **soccer**, **multi-sport** for both boys and girls!

Like the residents of Lowertown, the LCRC team, its staff and volunteers have faced adversity over the past year. Nevertheless, we continued to be creative and **flexible** in finding **solutions**. We worked miracles with the resources we had, all the while keeping the fires of justice burning and smiling all the way.

Finally, we would like to note that the coming year is not going to be easy. The organization and residents face **inequitable access** to existing facilities and infrastructure in their own neighbourhood. Access to gyms is inconsistent and our food bank operates in spaces that are **inadequate**. We intend to double our efforts to find adequate and appropriate solutions.

We thank all our team members, funders, partners, donors and the thousands of Lowertown residents who support us! We know that 2023-24 will see us continue our **social struggles**. We will continue to face the challenges with our usual relentlessness and optimism!

# **Social Support**

Providing immediate support while empowering residents

In addition to interventions, practical assistance\*, accompaniment, advocacy, referrals and short-term counselling to residents in need, our social support workers have initiated and implemented several activities aimed at supporting families by reducing their stress levels during critical periods such as Backto-School and holiday seasons.

During 2022-23, the number of contacts with Lowertowners amounted to 3,778.

# **Youth Connected**

By and for Lowertown youth

The group that created the **Youth Action Plan** has evolved into a committee whose mission is to raise awareness among organizations about the need to create spaces and programs for youth. In addition to its vision and mission, the committee also adopted a new visual identity, becoming **Lowertown Youth Connected**.

Supported by the LCRC, the committee remains dedicated to representing the voice of Lowertown's youth. In addition to volunteering, the young people have had a busy year of tangible achievements.

- Community Garden: With the support of the LCRC and Ottawa Community Housing, youth now have their own garden plot in Lowertown. They focused on growing organic garlic whose harvest will be made available to the community through our food bank.
- Collective Kitchen: Sensitive to the challenges faced by families living in emergency shelters (motels), youth prepared 80 warm desserts and distributed them to families.
- **Different Paths** is the title of the song composed by Youth Connected through which the youth affirmed their sense of belonging, shared their challenges and showcased the innovation they are capable of when given the opportunity. This initiative was made possible through funding from Crime Prevention Ottawa and mentoring from MASC and LCRC.
- Volunteering: During the year covered by this report, members
  of the Youth Connected committee were able to mobilize other
  youth to lend a hand in several community initiatives such as
  Movies in the Park, Holiday Program, Lowertown Celebration,
  Haunted House, and more.

# **After-School Program**

Club310 After-School Program has several objectives: to provide children aged 6 to 12 with a safe, caring environment in which they can complete their homework and learn skills in arts, culture and sports while building self-confidence. This program has a dual purpose as it allows many low-income parents to end their work or school day knowing that their children are in good hands. Thanks to the dedication and empathetic approach of our youth workers, 90 children had 182 days of professional and loving care.

Our Afterschool program is complemented by the **Transitions group**, which involves **20 youth**, aged 13-14 years old, three times a week for the duration of the school year. Transitions focuses on help with schoolwork and on the **acquisition of essential skills**.

An evaluation of the program, conducted by doctoral students at the University of Ottawa, found that the parents interviewed reported that the **After-School Program contributed to their children's increased self-esteem and independence**. Other parents stated that without the program, their children would not have access to arts and cultural activities.



# **Summer Camp**

Kids in Lowertown deserve it

Our summer camp offered fun activities to **103 children**, aged 6 to 12, while also developing their self-confidence and social skills. With access to the local pool, outings to the parks, exposure to the arts, and the building of friendships, joyful moments were created.





# Sports Activities An outlet for Lowertown's youth

More than a roadmap, the **Youth Action Plan** produced in 2021-2022 was a call to action. Our Centre responded by mobilizing partners around the **Lowertown / Strathcona Rising** initiative. Coordinated by the LCRC, this initiative also includes BGCO, Prezdential, and Sandy Hill Community Health Centre.

Through this partnership, sports activities are offered on several days of the week for all age groups from 6 to 18 years old.

 Basketball: Youth from Lowertown and Strathcona Heights aged 12 to 18+ participate in bilingual, age-appropriate basketball training sessions in a safe environment with qualified coaches from Prezdential. There is also a weekly basketball session for girls.

Basketball remains the most popular sport with **210** unique participants from **120** sessions.

• **Soccer and Futsal:** Soccer and Futsal: Participants aged 6 to 10 receive bilingual, age-appropriate instruction in the basic and intermediate levels of futsal and soccer with two qualified coaches hired by the LCRC.

**85 futsal sessions** involved a total of **81 participants** over 5 months with an average of 55 participants per month.

The summer Lowertown soccer league was made up of **160 children**.

- Training Soccer Coaches: The Lowertown / Strathcona Rising initiative has not only made sport accessible to youth in the community, but it has also created local expertise through the training of 5 residents to be soccer instructors/coaches.
- **Girls' Night:** Delivered by BGCO (Boys and Girls Club Ottawa), this weekly event offers a safe space and a variety of activities for girls aged 14-18.

# **Community House**

A different kind of gathering place

Despite its limited space, much of which is currently occupied by our food bank, the Community House continues to support residents in their daily needs by offering a **laundry service** as well as the **Millennium Learning Centre** which provides residents with access to computers and a printer.

Much to the delight of **160 children** from Lowertown, the Community House was once again transformed into a **Haunted House** for Halloween.

For **Winterfest**, staff and interns organized a tasting experience for the residents, introducing them to simple and tasty recipes made with canned beans, a food item that seems less familiar to newcomers.

# **Food Security**

Access to food in times of inflation

### **Food Bank**

Not surprisingly, the number of people using our food bank has increased significantly given the current inflation situation. Our team has worked hard to innovate in managing space and setting up processes while maintaining the goal of providing equitable service. The support provided by volunteers and interns has been invaluable.



Of note, timely support from the City of Ottawa has enabled the Centre to respond to the post-pandemic needs of residents, while additional support from the Ottawa Food Bank has allowed us to be more inclusive by introducing some vegetables that are highly valued by ethno-cultural communities (plantains, cassava, etc.).

### Other Initiatives

Families living in emergency shelters were able to access **5,017 warm meals** from April to December 2022. This initiative of support and solidarity was the result of a partnership between Food for Thought and the LCRC.

Thanks to a great collaboration with the Centre de services Guigues, the LCRC was able to offer **260 meals** to seniors.

### **Peace in the Streets**

The organization of the first Peace in the **Streets Basketball Tournament** with Prezdential is further proof of the community's commitment to a vision of peace, justice and equity. **Eight teams** from Ottawa communities Vanier, Russell Heights, Sandy Hill, Overbrook, Southeast, Pinecrest-Queensway and Lowertown took part.

### Docu-series in partnership with Bell Media

A **five-part** documentary series on Lowertown was produced through a contract with Bell Media and the expertise of documentary filmmaker Lévy L. Marquis.



### **Community Gardens**

**43 families** had access to the two community gardens supported by the LCRC. The results were as impressive as their efforts. Not only did they have fruits and vegetables to share, but they also had the opportunity to exchange knowledge, build relationships and have fun.

### Results of the LCRC's Community Garden Survey

- 90% of clients say that community gardens have allowed them to access **fresh healthy food**
- 100% of respondents believe that gardening has an impact on their well-being and mental health
- 100% say they have learned new gardening skills that they would not otherwise have had
- 90% of respondents said that they have connected with their neighbors through the community garden

### **Income Tax Clinics**

Thanks to the coordination of the LCRC and the dedication of our volunteers, **295 residents** were able to submit their tax returns through the LCRC's tax clinic. The result is several thousand dollars back in residents' bank accounts.
